

Year of St. Joseph St. Matthew's Gospel describes him as a "just man" (1: 19). struggles. But as people of Christ, we are commanded to share with others the good news of God's saving grace through the Lord Jesus. Unsaved people do not know how to trust in Christ and we need to lead the way for them to follow. Just like the four friends in Mark 2:1-12, we need to carry our friend who is "paralyzed" by sin and suffering to be healed by the Lord Jesus (our friend could be paralyzed because of COVID). The above passage tells of four (4) principles that we need to observe when we consider carrying other people. So, how do we carry others? Firstly, we need to carry our friends. Secondly, we need to carry our friends to Jesus. The direction we bring them towards is the Lord Jesus Christ. Thirdly, we need to carry our friends above other people. Like the four friends we need to give priority to the salvation of our friends. And finally, we need to carry our friends by faith. In Mark 2:5, Jesus saves the paralytic because of the faith of his friends. We are living in perilous times. We need to make our lives count. Indeed he who wins souls is wise. (Proverbs 11:30) We must look beyond our own personal problems and look out for others. Who are you carrying to Jesus today?

If you've already given something up for Great Lent ... it's not too late to embrace something, too. Volunteer somewhere and get up close and personal with people who can teach you about faith in the midst of poverty and despair. Go on a retreat and spend some time alone with God. Heal a relationship that you wrote off long ago. Be nice to telemarketers, the lepers of our time. Take a teenager to lunch and see the world through the eyes of youth. Call someone in a nursing home. Praise your spouse, your kids and your co-workers. Invite someone to lunch you wouldn't normally include. Use a talent you left buried. Pick up your clarinet, your novel, your paintbrush. Read something beautiful every day: a Bible passage, a poem. And smile. If you really believe in the promise of Easter, your face should show it.

"The value of fasting consists not only in avoiding certain foods, but in giving up sinful practices. The person who limits his fast only to abstaining from meat is the one who especially lowers the value of it. Do you fast? Prove it by doing good works. If you see someone in need, take pity on them. If you see a friend being honored, don't get jealous of him. For a true fast, you cannot fast only with your mouth. You must fast with your eyes, your ears, your feet, your hands and all parts of your body."



You are Forgiven and Healed

In Capernaum Jesus is surrounded by great numbers of people. As He preaches to the crowd, four friends of a paralyzed man lower him on his mat through the roof so that he can be close enough for Jesus to see him and cure him. Jesus responds to this act of faith, not by healing the man immediately, but by touching off the first of a series of controversial dialogues with the Scribes and Pharisees. When Jesus says, "Child, your sins are forgiven," He is as much as saying, "It is God whom you approach." In the Old Testament, only God is capable of forgiving sins; and it was expected that He would do so only at the end of time. It becomes clear why the Scribes murmur "he is blaspheming" and why Jesus brings it all out in the open. His claim to be able to forgive sins better reveals His identity as Son of God than do the miracles He performs.

Aware of the silent censure His forgiving word has caused in the crowd, Jesus proceeds to prove that "the Son of Man has authority to forgive sins on earth" by commanding the man to rise and walk in the sight of everyone. In concluding this miracle, Mark asks his readers to praise God for His presence in their midst as the forgiverhealer, just as the crowd did, even in the face of those who did not believe.

It is significant that Mark has chosen to present this miracle and teaching about Jesus' power to forgive sins so early in his Gospel drama. It shows that the need for the experience of God's forgiveness was as important to first-century Christians as it is today. Mark's readers praise God for saying clearly, and even today, "My sons, my daughters, I absolve you from your sins."


